


Panama

September - October 2021

Panama is home to approximately 14,200 refugees and asylumseekers. By 2021, 128,000 Venezuelans displaced abroad are estimated to be living in the country. 1, 412 refugees and asylum-seekers have been provided with legal assistance and 963 people were trained on protection issues between January and October 2021.

More than 900 asylum-seekers and refugees have been supported with multipurpose cash or vouchers, between January and October 2021.

CONTEXT

The refugee population is mainly composed of people from Colombia, Cuba, El Salvador, Nicaragua, and Venezuela. As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, refugees and asylum- seekers in Panama continue to face exacerbated risks and increased vulnerabilities, mainly due to the loss of opportunities to generate an income. Consequently, daily subsistence and rent has become a challenge.


Movements of people entering through Darien (southern border with Colombia) increased considerably, with only small numbers requesting international protection in Panama, whilst the overall majority continues in transit northward. So far in 2021, a new record number of 121,737 persons¹ have entered irregularly through the Darien gap, including 26,650 children. In October alone, the highest inflow was recorded for the year at 29.604 persons. Protection risks and humanitarian needs have increased in Darien. particularly for children and women within mixed movements.

UNHCR Response and Strategy

UNHCR works in close coordination with the Government, civil society, UN agencies, and refugees and asylum-seekers in Panama. Close coordination with the National Office for the Attention of Refugees (ONPAR) is maintained to channel support and continue strengthening the asylum system in the country. UNHCR closely liaises with the Ombudsperson's Office, the Electoral Tribunal, and the National Migration Service as well. UNHCR co-chairs with IOM the UN inter-agency group on human mobility, which coordinates humanitarian support and interventions related to the mixed movements in Darien and Chiriquí provinces. UNHCR has also established partnership agreements with different national and international organizations, including NRC, HIAS, the Pastoral of Human Mobility (PMH), Panamanian Red Cross, Fútbol con Corazón (FCC), and Fundación Espacio Creativo (FEC). Furthermore, UNHCR supports the government in implementing their commitments under the Comprehensive Regional Protection and Solutions Framework (MIRPS).

Main Activities

Alongside the government, partner organizations, civil society, development actors, and UN Agencies, UNHCR undertakes protection and solutions



Protection

- UNCHR together with staff from the Ombudsman's Office, NRC, HIAS, RET and ONPAR delivered jointly a 3-day International Protection Workshop 74 government officials from SENAFRONT, National Migration Service, National Police, Ministries of Labour, Education and Social Development, Electoral Tribunal, SENADIS, SINAPROC, and peace judges participated in the workshop. Moreover, UNHCR delivered a training on international protection to 25 Human Rights Officers of the Ombudsman's Office.
- UNHCR conducted field missions to the Reception Centres in Darien to monitor the mixed movements conditions. UNHCR will support various actions to improve the infrastructure of the RHU in San Vicente and equip the healthcare centre in Bajo Chiquito with solar panels. Additional community based interventions are being implemented in the transit communities of Lajas Blancas and Peñitas.
- UNHCR and HIAS delivered a donation of construction materials to the municipality of La Chorrera to support the building of the municipal service centre for GBV survivors, where asylum-seekers, refugees and host communities will have access to essential response services from state institutions and civil organizations.
- UNHCR through partner Fútbol con Corazón (FCC) trained 16 public-school teachers on forced displacement, human rights, basic principles of protection and timely referral mechanisms for asylum-seekers.

■↑ Humanitarian Assistance

- UNHCR through partners supported 271 individuals with multipurpose cash (for food, medicines, rent payments) and/or temporary accommodations between September and October.
- UNHCR donated 5,000 blankets to the Migratory Reception Center in Chiriqui for the most vulnerable people within mixed movements who must stay in the Center for a longer time due to illnesses or lack of resources to continue their transit northward. Furthermore, UNHCR donated mosquito nets and solar lamps to the transit community of Canaan Membrillo in Darien. Alo solar lamps were donated, in alliance with the Panamanian Red Cross, to Lajas Blqncas migratory reception center, targeting the sector where temporary COVID partners are maintained under quarantine.



Durable Solutions and Livelihoods

- UNHCR together with City of Knowledge, HIAS, and the Panamanian Red Cross held the Urban Market of Refugee Entrepreneurship, where 20 entrepreneurs showcased and sold their products.
- After a three-month training on aesthetic treatment techniques, 12 persons graduated from the Beauty Course at the Maribel Technical School. Moreover, 18 people participated in a livelihoods workshop on soft and employability skills as part of the Talento sin Fronteras programme.
- UNHCR through partner Panamanian Red Cross delivered cash assistance for access to education to 12 university students enrolled in different majors.



Advocacy and Peaceful Coexistence

 UNHCR through partner Espacio Creativo inaugurated the photo exhibit Travesías: del desarraigo a la pertenencia, as part of the local cultural movement FotoSeptiembre. The exhibit is the final phase of a social cohesion project between refugee and Panamanian youth.


