Historical commitment to protection. Paraguay is a State Party to the 1951 Convention and its 1967 Protocol since 1970.

Protection and prevention of statelessness. Paraguay acceded to the 1954 Convention relating to the Status of Stateless People in 2014, and the 1961 Convention on the Reduction of Statelessness in 2012.

Adoption of a new law on statelessness. On 9 August 2018 Paraguay's bicameral Congress approved a bill which protects the rights of stateless people, as well as applicants for the recognition of such status, and a facilitated path to naturalization.

HIGHLIGHTS

In February 2019, the National Migration Directorate of Paraguay adopted Resolution 62/2019 to introduce a temporary residence scheme with more flexible requirements for Venezuelan nationals. It enables them to apply for a temporary residence of 1 year with relevant exceptions to the regular and otherwise strict visa requirements.

In August 2018, Paraguay enacted a new Law (N° 6.149) for the **protection and naturalization of stateless people**. Paraguay became the first country in the Americas to approve a law for protection and naturalization of stateless people, when the bicameral Congress approved a bill presented in May 2017, which protects the rights of stateless people, as well as applicants for the recognition of such status, including a facilitated path to naturalization.

The domestic legal framework dealing with refugees is set out in the 2002 Refugee Law Nº 1938 "Ley General sobre Refugiados", which is in line with international standards of protection, including the regional extended refugee definition in line with the 1984 Cartagena Declaration.



Working with Partners

- UNHCR works in close coordination with Government counterparts, namely with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the Ministry of Interior, the multi-sectorial National Refugee Commission (CONARE), as well as with other UN agencies to provide protection and seek durable solutions for refugees. UNHCR is a member of CONARE.
- "Semillas para la Democracia" is UNHCR's partner implementing projects aimed at providing basic humanitarian assistance and supporting socio-economic inclusion of refugees and asylum-seekers and Venezuelan nationals.

Main Activities

Protection & Durable Solutions

- Support the Government in the institutional strengthening of the national asylum system, in
 particular of the CONARE's Secretariat through the implementation of activities in line with the
 Brazil Plan of Action. CONARE, its technical Secretariat and the RSD procedure, are fully
 funded by the Government.
- Advocate for the implementation of Law N° 6.149 for the protection of stateless persons and
 the establishment of a statelessness determination procedure in line with the pledges made by
 the Government of Paraguay including those under the Brazil Plan of Action.
- Promote a greater engagement of relevant Government institutions in the development of a comprehensive strategy towards the local integration of refugees.
- Strengthen the engagement with the UN system to ensure the inclusion of persons of concern in the national development plan and the UN Sustainable Development Cooperation Framework.
- Provide capacity building and training to relevant counterparts.
- Promote the implementation of a border protection strategy by CONARE and civil society at the Paraguay-Brazilian border to identify and refer persons of concern to UNHCR, prevent their refoulement and support them through counselling, shelter and humanitarian assistance among other services.

Humanitarian Assistance & Community Empowerment and Self-Reliance

- "Semillas para la Democracia" has provided humanitarian assistance to 60 asylum-seekers and refugees with specific needs. The assistance consists of financial and in-kind support as well as counselling to promote their local integration through, inter alia, access to public education and health.
- "Semillas para la Democracia" has engaged four private sector partners, as well as financial service providers, specialized civil society organizations, line ministries and the UN, to strengthen economic inclusion of persons of concern through access to employment, self-employment and financial inclusion.
- Through a cooperation with "Fundación Paraguaya", refugees and asylum-seekers with an entrepreneurial profile receive technical and financial training and guidance to set up a business. "Semillas para la Democracia" complements this initiative by awarding seed capital to entrepreneurs and offering tailored orientations to 164 PoC regarding employment and capacity building opportunities available to them
